#### **MINISTER'S MESSAGE**

#### The Gift of Love

I've been thinking about LOVE a lot lately. This has been partly prompted by the "Love Chapter" (1 Corinthians 13) that came up in the lectionary readings for a Sunday recently. It has also been encouraged by our preparations for the upcoming "Celebration of Love" fine dining event at the church on Sunday evening, February 10. And my focus on Love has been reinforced by the fact that we are coming up to Valentine's Day next week.

So, in thinking about LOVE...I've been pondering the unconditional love God has for each one of us; considering the greatest commandment God has given us, that is to love God and to love our neighbours as ourselves; and I've been giving thanks for the wonderful love I have been blessed to experience in my life.

At this time of the year we would do well to pause and appreciate the gift of love we have received, and to be intentional about showing some love for the people in our lives. Whether we give gifts to our spouses, write Valentines for our friends, or do something special for someone who may be suffering from loneliness or loss, Valentine's Day gives us a little push in the direction of sharing God's love in word and deed, and that in itself is a gift.

For your reflection on the gift of love I offer the section headed "Love" taken from *Living Faith: A Statement of Christian Belief,* which is a contemporary statement of faith of our denomination, The Presbyterian Church in Canada. I particularly like the very last line: "Love foreshadows life in heaven." Think about that whenever you experience the love of a friend, parent, child, partner, neighbour, or stranger. Think about that whenever you decide to show love for someone yourself. Love expressed, enacted, and shared in this life is a glimpse, a taste, a foreshadowing of life in heaven.

#### 8.3 Love

We bow before the mystery of God's love. From it came our creation. By it we are daily nurtured. Through it we find salvation. A consuming fire of purity, God's love is yet warm and gentle compassion. We respond to the God who is love by loving in return.

Love means seeking the best for others and is the mark of a Christian. Love for God leads to love for others. We cannot claim to love God, whom we do not see, if we hate those about us, whom we do see. Love of God and of neighbour fulfils the law of God.

Love is compassion for creation. Love is the service of others and is not self-centred. Love speaks the truth tempered with kindness. Love grows in knowledge and discernment. It is the road to Christian maturity, and is the way of seeing others as God sees them. Love follows the example of Jesus Christ.

We should also love ourselves. Self-love is not selfishness. We love and accept ourselves because God has already loved and accepted us in Christ,

providing the foundation of our sense of worth.

Love is the greatest gift in the world because it will last beyond this world and is supremely pleasing to our Lord. Love foreshadows life in heaven.

#### **SESSION**

The applications for our Refugee Sponsorship family were submitted in December. Now we wait as the paperwork travels through channels. We anticipate that it may be as long as two years before our family is approved, but we hope it happens sooner than that! Our budget for the project is approximately \$60,000. We received \$3000 prior to the end of 2018 and so far in 2019, we have received \$2440. We circulated pledge cards in the bulletins in January and we have about a dozen pledges in already, totalling approximately \$12,000. If you haven't submitted your pledge card yet, you can drop it in the offering plate or turn it in at the church office. Thank you for your generous contributions!

The Session and Board of Managers held a joint meeting on February 6 to consider the 2019 budget. It will be presented at our annual meeting on April 14 following worship. Lunch will be provided. Please mark your calendar and plan to attend this important event in the life of our church.

No matter the topic I always seem to find a connection to raise some questions of faith, and I've left every Book Club meeting feeling enriched and encouraged by the thoughts, experiences, and reflections of the group.

### WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY 2019

It was a very cold and stormy time in Regina to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 20 – 27, 2019. However, with several opportunities for Christians in our city to gather and pray together for justice and unity, we marked the occasion quite well. A few members of First Presbyterian Church attended the "Singing into Unity" service at Westminster United Church on January 20<sup>th</sup> and others took part in the closing service at Resurrection Roman Catholic Parish on January 27<sup>th</sup>.

Although I was the lone Presbyterian at the "Beer & Bible" event at O'Hanlon's Irish Pub on the Friday evening, it was one of the highlights of the week for me. It included about 12-15 Christians from a variety of traditions getting together at the pub to discuss Scripture and this year's Week of Prayer for Christian Unity theme: "Justice, and only justice, you shall pursue" (Deuteronomy 16:20). We hope that similar gatherings may be organized ecumenically throughout the year!

I have been participating in the Regina Council of Churches since moving to this city, and was recently involved in some of the organizing for the closing worship service. Initially, the preacher was to have been the Anglican Bishop, the Rev. Rob Hardwick, but due to a family emergency he was away that week. Although a number of potential preachers were approached, the task eventually fell to me, and I had the honour of reflecting on the theme and text provided by the Churches of Indonesia.

As you may know, the Churches of one country work together ecumenically each year to provide theme texts, reflections, Bible study materials, and worship resources. This year's material focused on the call to all Christians and Churches to pursue justice as a first priority.
