MINISTER'S MESSAGE

On Sunday, June 4th, our worship included two important themes – the Triune nature of God and our call to become communities of welcome and inclusion for all people. Thanks to Jo Morris for supplying the rainbow balloons to brighten our worship space. The variety of colours was a good reminder of the beauty of diversity made by God in the Creation of the world and all its creatures including people. Thank you to Chloe Golden (Music Director), Marianne Woods (soloist) and the choir for sharing a beautiful and appropriate anthem "You Say" by Lauren Daigle. (And thanks also to Marianne's nephew for suggesting the song!)



One of the things I said in my sermon was that pride parades are not about 2SLGBTQI+ people saying they are better than other people. It's not that kind of pride. But rather, they're about people who have been marginalized, ridiculed, excluded, and told that they must change their identities in order to be good enough coming together to affirm for one another that they are worthy of love just as they are. When First Church folk participate in the Regina Pride Parade on Saturday, June 10th, our message will be "God's Love Includes Everyone."

I invite you to read the words of Lauren Daigle's song (in case you didn't catch every word when the choir sang it last Sunday). Notice that it's a prayer. The "You" in the lyrics is God. And notice that whenever the singer is inclined to think poorly of themself, God affirms again and again that they are enough, they are loved. Our job as the church is to speak those words of love to people who need to hear them today.

2023 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The 2023 General Assembly took place from Sunday June 4 to Wednesday June 7, and was held in-person at St. Mary's University in Halifax, Nova Scotia. This in-person gathering provided an opportunity for the church to consider matters affecting the ministry and mission of our denomination.

Commissioners, who are responsible for the business of Assembly, discern and make decisions. At Assembly, commissioners, young adult and student representatives welcome ecumenical and interfaith guests. The Rev. Bob Wilson and Heather Neuls were the commissioners from our Presbytery of Assiniboia. Asher Ferozdin participated as the Young Adult Representative for Assiniboia, and Donna Wilkinson assisted as the coordinator of the YAR program at Assembly.

The Assembly began with opening worship last Sunday, June 4th at St. David's Presbyterian Church in Halifax. The outgoing Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Bob Faris preached the sermon. Following worship, the Rev. Mary Fontaine was confirmed and installed as the 2023 General Assembly Moderator. Mary is the first moderator of Indigenous descent, and is originally from the Mistawasis First Nation here in Saskatchewan.

<u>The Parents Circle – Families Forum: The 2023</u> <u>Cutting Edge of Mission Award Recipient</u> Each year at the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, an award is given to recognize a person or group for their work on the cutting edge of mission.

The annual award this year recognizes the work of The Parents Circle – Families Forum (PCFF)—a joint Israeli-Palestinian organization of over 600 families who have lost immediate family members to the ongoing conflict and who work together for reconciliation and a just resolution to the conflict. The award was accepted during the 2023 General Assembly in Halifax, Nova Scotia, by two advocates representing PCFF. The advocates, Laila AlShekh and Robi Damelin work toward reconciliation and sustainable peace.



GROW HOPE SASKATCHEWAN

World hunger is a growing crisis in the world. Grow Hope Saskatchewan is an effective way to help. Farmers donate acres to grow crops and other folks contribute donations to pay for seed, fuel, fertilizer etc. The proceeds from each acre are donated to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank where the funds can be used by PWS&D for projects around the world that combat world hunger. Farmers receive \$350 an acre for inputs. Acres can be donated, or

"Feed the hungry and help those in trouble. Then your light will shine out from the darkness, and the darkness around you will be bright as noon." (Isaiah 58:10, NLT)

How it works

- Generous farmers in Saskatchewan have agreed to donate land to grow a crop for Grow Hope.
- Generous people like you sponsor the growth of a crop with a donation to help cover the input expenses.
 Donors receive a charitable donation receipt from the Synod of Saskatchewan.
- 3. After harvest, farmers sell the crop and donate the proceeds to the partners of Grow Hope, including the Synod of Saskatchewan. The proceeds from the sale of the crop can be as much as \$600 per acre or more. These funds are often matched up to 4:1 by the Government of Canada and distributed to PWS&D and the other partner agencies through the Foodgrains Bank.

Turn \$350 into as much as \$3,000 to provide food.

This project is a response to God's invitation to participate in the work of restoring humanity's relationship to God, to each other, and to creation.

Grow Hope is a great project for individuals, families, schools & churches!
