MINISTER'S MESSAGE

Advent and Christmas at First Church The Season of Advent begins on Sunday, November 28th with four Sundays leading up to Christmas. Worship will include lighting the Advent Candles of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love, with the Scripture readings and preaching highlighting the theme of waiting for Jesus to be born, while we also wait for his coming again in glory. Music will include Advent and Christmas hymns, anthems, and solos, to brighten our hearts and lead us into a joyful celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ our Lord.

If you are fully vaccinated and comfortable attending worship in-person, please consider joining us in the sanctuary for worship during this special season of the year. We will continue to livestream all the services for those who are unable to attend.

Go deeper this Season of Advent by participating in the **"Presbyterians Read" Advent Book Study** on Adam Hamilton's book, "Incarnation: Rediscovering the Significance of Christmas." If you would like a copy of the book, let Rev. Amanda know THIS WEEKEND (Nov. 13-14) so that she will order enough books. Then consider joining the Tuesday evening discussion group on Zoom starting on Nov. 30th at 7:00 pm, and continuing Dec. 7, 14, & 21.

Try out the spiritual practice of pilgrimage by participating in the **Walk to Bethlehem** during this Advent Season. Check out the details below.

Mark your calendar now for two special worship services. The **Blue Christmas Service** will be on Wed. Dec. 15th at 7:00 pm. This service acknowledges that December can be a difficult and even sad season for many of us, whether due to grief, loss, loneliness, or stress. This quiet service of music and prayer will be an opportunity to rest in God's presence without expectations, and it will include an opportunity to light a candle in memory of a loved one who has died. The **Christmas Eve Service** will be on Fri. Dec. 24th at 7:00 pm. Bring your family and invite your friends to this joyful celebration of the birth of Christ. Our large sanctuary has plenty of room to gather without getting too crowded, and it has been two years since we last had the opportunity to celebrate Christmas together!

Also watch the announcements for **Advent and Christmas Hymn Sings online**. These will be great little videos for you to watch, sing along with, or just play in the background to bring some light into your December.

<u>Walk to Bethlehem: An Advent Pilgrimage</u> As you likely know, I do like to walk. When I started walking every day five years ago, I discovered that walking improved my health, gave me more energy, made me feel better about myself, allowed me time to think and pray, and connected me to others. It all began when I decided to embark on an Advent Pilgrimage – the Walk to Bethlehem. This Season of Advent, I want to invite you to walk with me. Whether you already include walking in your daily life, or whether you will be stretching yourself to start moving a little more, please consider joining me.

Mary and Joseph walked from Nazareth to Bethlehem, a journey of about 111 km. You can choose whatever distance you would like to walk each day, but one possible goal is to walk the full distance of 111 km in the 28 days of Advent – about 4 km each day. You can walk indoors in the gymnasium at First Church or outdoors on the sidewalks and pathways. One circle around the main section of Wascana Lake just happens to be 4 km!

You can count your steps and distance with various watches or pedometer devices. There are many free apps available for iPhones or Android phones that you can also download. Or don't worry about the exact distance too much, and just walk every day. It's your choice. The biblical texts each day are meant to help you meditate as you walk your Advent journey to the manger by reminding us of the Advent promises that are ours in Jesus – Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love. Some of the passages refer to walking and our journey of faith.

You can pick up a copy of the "Walk to Bethlehem" booklet in the narthex at the church. It includes instructions, Bible passages for each day, and a log sheet to keep track of your distance or steps. May this Advent journey be a blessing to you as you journey towards Christmas and to the gift of Emmanuel, God with us.

You are also welcome to literally walk with me in the gymnasium at First Church. I'll be walking there from 11 am – Noon Tuesdays to Fridays, starting on Nov. 30th.

PWS&D - Afghanistan Access to food has



become a critical issue in Afghanistan, but we have the opportunity to respond and

help people get through a most challenging time. Will you join us?

In October, the United Nations estimated that over 18 million Afghans—half of the country's population—are facing a humanitarian crisis. Currently 1 in 3 people are hungry and 2 million children are malnourished. The numbers will only increase as winter sets in.

PWS&D is planning an emergency food assistance project with an experienced partner on the ground. This project is in partnership with Canadian Foodgrains Bank which provides access to matching funds, meaning donations will reach as many people as possible.

Cash transfers to the most vulnerable families will help them buy food and pay for critical items, with the hopes of livelihood recovery in the new year. Aid to internally displaced people and host communities, with a focus on women-headed households, the elderly and people with disabilities, will have an enormous impact.

Join us in praying for the people of Afghanistan, given the ever-evolving situation on the ground and the serious humanitarian crisis that is developing.

The worsening situation in Afghanistan means our support and solidarity are needed now more than ever. Please make cheques payable to First Presbyterian Church marked "Afghanistan".

<u>Toiletries for Camp Marjorie</u>: UPDATE Thank you to those who have already made donations of toiletries for Camp Marjorie. The camp has indicated that they have enough supplies right now, and the greater need is for meals for the people.

THEY WERE LOVED: <u>A Covid Tribute</u>

MacLean's recently had published an article in which one of First Church members was recognized.

<u>They Were Loved</u> The magnitude of COVID-19's impact on Canadians' lives is difficult to fathom. Canada has already lost more than 20,000 people to the pandemic, with the number ticking steadily upwards; each of those losses has cascaded through families and communities, leaving many more thousands bereaved. Public health guidance around social distancing has resulted in restrictions around traditional mourning customs and rituals—heartwrenchingly, many were unable even to say goodbye. They Were Loved is an obituary project to commemorate thousands of coronavirus victims, as well as to mark this historic moment in Canadian history. Our goal: to pay tribute to everyone who has died of COVID-19 in Canada, and every Canadian who has died of the disease abroad. In partnership with Carleton University's Future of Journalism Initiative and journalism schools across Canada, Maclean's is striving to capture the richness of each life lost in elegant obituaries.



Joan Frew

A compassionate social butterfly

Joan Jemima Frew was born on Nuttal farm, just outside of Pense, Sask., in 1934. She and her twin sister, Joyce, had plans to become nurses. "The nursing school didn't let them room together, so they didn't go," says Kathy

Hancock, Joan's daughter. Joan and Joyce were inseparable-the two even shared a double wedding in 1956. Joan married her husband of 62 years, H. Don Frew, and spent over 25 years working with Saskatchewan's ministry of health in the deputy minister's office and later in vital statistics. When she retired, she took up her hobby of woodworking full time. "She made hundreds of wooden tulips," says Kathy. Later in life, she took loving care of her husband, Don. "Dad got dementia about 12 years before he passed away, and my mom was his primary caregiver," says Kathy. Joan spent the last years of her life at a personal care home in Regina. She was a devoted Presbyterian parishioner. "A couple years ago Mum said that she knew God's purpose for why she was still here [on earth]," Kathy says. "It was to provide compassion to the people in the care home." This is exactly what Joan did. When her friends in the home needed more exercise, she would get them up and walking around, even though she used a walker herself. "She was a social butterfly," says Kathy with a laugh.

EXPLORING OUR SACRED TESTS: <u>A conversation about stewarding</u> <u>our common life</u>



Over the last month, Rev. Amanda was pleased to participate in three online conversations with Rabbi Jeremy Parnes and Imam Dr. Mohamed Masloh on the topics of Generosity, Hospitality, and Compassion. Organized by the Ecumenical Stewardship Committee of the Anglican Diocese of Qu'Appelle, the Saskatchewan Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church In Canada, and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Regina, these interfaith conversations brought together 60-90 participants on Zoom and they were livestreamed to YouTube.

In these days of increased social polarization and intolerance, where racism, antisemitism, and Islamophobia appear to be increasing daily, dialogue between faith communities is an antidote to ignorance and hatred. Generosity, hospitality, and compassion are social virtues that can heal the wounds of our society.

- This process is designed to align with the annual congregational planning process.
- Applications are to be received in the Church office by December 31st.
- The Stewardship Committee reviews applications, considers money available, and develops recommendations.
- The Stewardship Committee presents all applications, with recommendations, to the joint Board/Session meeting in January/ February.
- All applications are forwarded from the joint Board/Session meeting, with recommendations, to the congregational Annual General Meeting (AGM).
- Applications are considered for approval by the congregation at the AGM.
- Other applications arising during the remainder of the calendar year may be considered as funds are available. For amounts up to \$2000, the Session may approve projects. For amounts over \$2000, congregational approval is required.
