MINISTER'S MESSAGE

How I Spent My Summer Vacation

Do you remember writing reflections for back-toschool in September with titles something like that? I certainly do. And even if I have great memories of summers at camps with my friends and on holidays with my family, I always enjoyed getting back to school again and sharing about all my adventures with my teachers and friends.

I hope that you had a good summer of 2021, despite the limitations imposed by the ongoing pandemic and the many difficult things taking place in the world including forest fires, earthquakes, and hurricanes, political strife in many parts of the world, a challenging season for farmers in Saskatchewan, and the discovery of unmarked graves and neglected cemeteries on the sites of former Residential Schools across Canada.

I was fortunate to be able to take most of my holidays during the summer (one week in July and three weeks in August) and although there were a few interruptions, I had a pretty good break. It was an enjoyable time, including a long 5-day walk in South-East SK with the Saskatchewan History and Folklore Society, some quiet time at home, and a four-day visit home to Ottawa. While we were back in Ottawa, Nick and I celebrated our 20th wedding anniversary. The day included a visit to my home church where we got married, lunch with the current minister at St. Giles, a visit to the digital Van Gogh exhibit, and a nice dinner with most of my family.

During the summer, I also participated in several conversations, email strings, and meetings regarding former residential school cemeteries in Saskatchewan.

In my new role as Clerk of the Synod of Saskatchewan, I began to make arrangements for the educational component at the Annual Synod Meeting (Oct. 15-16, 2021) to be on this topic. Allyson Carr (PCC Justice Ministries) will be making a presentation about the PCC's responsibility and involvement in healing and reconciliation work, and Sarah Longman (President of the Regina Indian Industrial School (RIIS) Commemorative Association) will be presenting about the ongoing work at the RIIS cemetery here in Regina. I hope you'll consider attending this online event. Details are included later in this newsletter.

In addition to this, I recruited and equipped Presbyterian representatives to attend a feast at the Okanese First Nation in honour of the children who attended and never came home from File Hills Residential School. Thanks to Rev. Roberto deSandoli and several members of St. Andrew's in Saskatoon who represented us on August 20th.

I also accepted an invitation to attend a meeting at Key First Nation with three First Nations in that area regarding several former residential schools, which took place on August 23rd. The PCC operated Crowstand Residential School on the Cote First Nation from 1885 – 1915. I was able to connect with an elder who is leading work on searching the grounds of the former school, and to connect him with PCC Justice Ministries and possible financial support for this work. I expect that the relationship will continue, and there may be opportunities for Presbyterians to participate in this important and difficult work in the coming months.

Finally, during my long walk in South-East Saskatchewan during my holidays, I had the opportunity to stay overnight at Camp McKay, the former site of the Round Lake Residential School which was operated by the PCC from 1885-1925, and then by the United Church of Canada until it closed around 1950. Camp McKay was operated as a summer camp for several decades, and then around 1990 it was

sold to the Ochapowace First Nation. That community continues to operate the site as a camp for their community and local families. I was able to meet an elder, HeadWoman Shelley Bear, and speak to her about the work they have recently begun in searching the property for any unmarked graves.

Finally, I was invited by the Life & Mission Agency Nominating Committee to serve on a small discernment committee to review requests for funds for cemetery commemoration and related work. The first meeting happened earlier this week, and we granted \$40,000 to support the Ground-Penetrating Radar equipment to search the grounds at Round Lake.

As September has arrived, my schedule is filling up with meetings, visits, and church programs getting going once again. It was an absolute joy to welcome a little larger congregation at the church last Sunday Sept. 5th for our celebration of Holy Communion, and I hope to see many more of you again soon (whether online or in person). When I do see you again, I hope you'll share with me about how you spent your summer vacation!


KAIROS Election 2021 Resource
